The new practice was established in April 2018 and will employ the physicians and staff who currently make up Urology Associates, Inc. when they join South County Urology in August. The acquisition of the daVinci Xi for robotic-assisted urologic and general surgeries will allow the group to grow and provide a higher level of care for patients.

incorporating the latest technology and improved surgical outcomes into the specialty. As the practice transitions, Dr. Richard Zuerner, who has been with the group since 1972, will retire.

"The partnership will offer greater accessibility and availability of care to our patients," Dr. Heffernan said. "With the addition of Dr. Renzulli to the practice and South County Health's acquisition of the da Vinci Xi robotic-assisted surgical system, we can offer even greater surgical capabilities."

Although robotic technology will be used in the OR, South County Urology will continue its personalized, patient-centric philosophy.

"We pride ourselves in providing high quality urologic care, but at the same time have a touch of old-time medicine," said Dr. Sarazen. "We'll sit down and talk to the patient and spend time listening to his or her needs and concerns."

When physicians retire, we share their joy, but feel the void.

Whether most of us are aware of it or not, the long hours spent in the clinic and hospital tending to patients is what forges our identity as physicians and citizens both inside and outside of work. While we may bemoan the stressors of our jobs, of which there are many, most of us still derive great satisfaction from our work and the status it brings us. It should not be surprising that for many physicians retirement from the mental stimulation and social interaction involved in the daily practice of medicine can create a void. Hopefully, for the majority of us, that feeling is more than offset by the joys of new-found freedoms such as spending more time with family and pursuing non-medical passions.

The retirement of a physician can have a larger impact as well. This is particularly true for a doctor who has been a pillar of the medical and greater community for over three decades. For these select few physicians, the vacuum that their retirement creates in the medical community, for colleagues and patients, is immense. Don McNiece is one of those rare physicians.

Long regarded as one of the top internists in Rhode Island, Don's commitment to his patients is as legendary as his pre-sunrise hospital rounds. Upon meeting Don early in my career, it was quickly evident that he was in many ways, the epitome of the traditional 'town doc'. To the end, Don eschewed electronic medical records and viewed his commitment to his patients as an around-the-clock responsibility. The dedication Don demonstrated to his patients was, I can assure you, reciprocated.

Within a week of his retirement announcement I had numerous patients express to me what I can only describe as near panic as they contemplated life without Dr. McNiece. I consoled his patients and ensured them that we have many excellent and experienced physicians in South County who are more than capable of caring for them. They took some solace, but countered that "no one can really replace Don."

They are right.



South County Health’s Infection Prevention Team presents at ANCC Pathway Conference

A team of nurses from South County Health traveled to the Palm Beach Convention Center on May 1 – 3 where they made a presentation on infection prevention. Lauren Burke, Stephanie Parente, and Siobhan Ryan were invited to the 2018 ANCC Pathway Conference for a poster presentation on the elimination of Hospital Acquired Infections (HAI) and Catheter Associated Urinary Tract Infections (CAUTI).

The nurses were among the 83 presenters who were invited to share clinical successes based on protocols they implemented to lower HAI/CAUTIs at South County Hospital. The ANCC Pathway Conference was attended by nurses from the United States and internationally.

BERMUDA



Known for its namesake shorts, rum, and triangle, Bermuda is a popular tourist destination with clear water and pink sand beaches drawing countless visitors to the island.

Bermuda, an archipelago consisting of 181 islands, is located approximately 600 miles off the North Carolina coast. The temperatures in the humid subtropical climate range from an average low of 60 degrees F in the winter months, to an average high of 85 degrees F in the summer. Although Bermuda is not located in the Caribbean, its climate and geography gives it a similar feel to that of its tropical island neighbors.

What to do

Since there are no car rentals in Bermuda, land travel is by foot, scooters, and public transportation. But to avoid traffic altogether, can catch the [SeaExpress](#) ferry that shuttles passengers from port-to-port around the island.

Among the beaches waiting to be explored is [Tobacco Bay Beach](#) in Bermuda's East End. Nearby are historic attractions and colorful architecture, and the calm, clear water offers great snorkeling where you can swim among parrotfish, grouper, angelfish and other undersea inhabitants. After a day at the beach, [Tobacco Bay Bonfire & Bohemia](#) is nearby, offering food and drinks, live music, and a beachside bonfire after dark.



For the adventurous, some of Bermuda's beauty is found underground in places like Crystal Caves and Blue Hole Park. Walking tours through [Crystal Caves](#) lead you to a 55-foot deep subterranean

lake with stalagmites and limestone 'icicles' among the rock formations. [Blue Hole Park](#) is a 12-acre nature reserve that features walking trails through a jungle, cliff jumping, and cave exploration on land and in the water.

The [Royal Naval Dockyard](#) is a popular for its historical and commercial attractions. Historically, the dockyard played a significant role for the British military during the War of 1812 and WWII. Today, it is a major cruise ship port, with an array of tourist

attractions nearby. At [Dockyard Glassworks](#), you can watch local glass artists create unique items that can also be purchased. And while you're there, visit

The [Bermuda Rum Cake Company](#) to watch the traditional confectionaries being made.

Getting there

Given its proximity to the Carolinas' coast, Bermuda is about two hours away by air. Many cruise lines offer four-, five-, and seven-night cruises that leave from various ports along the east coast. The actual lengths of stay on the island vary, but cruise ship travelers typically enjoy the journey as much, if not more than, the destination.

BLACK BEAN DIP

INGREDIENTS

Tortilla Strips

- 6 whole wheat tortillas (8-inch diameter)
- 1 1/2 Tbsp canola oil
- 1/2 tsp ground cumin
- 1/8 tsp ground cayenne pepper or to taste, optional

Dip

- 1 plum tomato, diced
- 1 small red onion, diced
- 1 Tbsp fresh cilantro, chopped, plus sprigs for garnish
- 2 can (15 oz) black beans, rinsed and drained
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 2 tsp ground cumin
- 1 Tbsp fresh lime juice
- 1 Tbsp hot sauce, optional
- 1/8 tsp salt

PREPARATION

Tortilla Strips

Preheat oven to 400°. Line 3 baking sheets with parchment paper and lightly coat the paper with nonstick cooking spray. Brush the tortillas with the oil. Cut tortillas in half, and cut each half into 5 strips (about 60 strips). Arrange the tortilla strips in 1 layer on the baking sheets.

In a small bowl, combine cumin and cayenne pepper, if using, and sprinkle over the tortilla strips. Bake for 10 minutes, or until browned, rotating baking sheets after 5 minutes.

Dip

In a food processor, place the tomato, onion and cilantro and pulse until well chopped. Add the black beans, garlic, cumin, lime juice, hot sauce (if using) and salt, and pulse until the mixture is mostly smooth.

Serve garnished with fresh cilantro sprigs and the tortilla strips.
